I don't think any of us could have imagined the events of 2022 in Ukraine or indeed the challenges currently being faced across Europe. The reality of war has proved very vividly that life is uncertain and fragile. Our response was immediate, with the launch of a major appeal and teams of staff and volunteers living and working in Ukraine and on the borders of Romania and Moldova helping with food, clothing and shelter.

Central to this vital work has been the growing number of partnerships the Mission has with local churches in Ukraine and the surrounding countries. These have enabled us to help over 84,000 refugee families with aid.

Here in the UK, we have been humbled by the generosity of supporters, companies, churches and charitable trusts who helped us raise £454,000 for Ukraine in 2022 and continue to support our response in this devastated country.

What is so moving is the resilience of Ukrainians. Misha Vaveliuk, an MWB colleague in Ukraine, said "there has never been such unity among our people. We have learned to be more thankful: for electricity for a couple of hours a day, for warm radiators in the house, for a hot meal. We have begun to pray more. Romans 12 v21 says, "Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good." Everyone is helping and supporting anyone in greater need than themselves. God bless you!"

The developments in Ukraine led to many changed plans, particularly in Moldova and Romania where so many refugees needed practical help and support. Praise God for the flexibility and sacrificial hard work of each member of the MWB team. Despite this crisis, a full program of work was carried out in all the other countries, and it is a joy to report that in 2022 we reached 30,000 individuals through our children and family support programs, working with 2,515 families, up 10% on last year. We have also established new programs for example a family project in Sarajevo, Bosnia Herzegovina.

Mission Without Borders has been working in eastern Europe for over 60 years, providing practical assistance and spiritual support to children and families facing desperate poverty. Looking forward, we are evaluating future needs and the possibilities of developing new programs, guided by our experienced teams on the ground and relationships with local churches.

Thank you again for your prayers, for your advocacy of our ministry, for your generosity and kindness and for your partnership in this precious and vital work.

### **ALBANIA**

Facts: Population: 2.8 million

32% of the population are severely food insecure.

33% of child deaths are due to malnutrition.

Education is a major focus of our work in Albania. Last year more scholarship students were supported by the Mission in Albania than in any other country we work in and 75 children attended After School classes.



"Considering the financially vulnerable are the ones most affected by the global crisis, we responded by increasing the number of families we support in all our communities," Monika explains. We foresee further growth of numbers and projects in 2023."

# BULGARIA

Facts: Population: 6.5 million

70% of our beneficiaries do not have an inside toilet.

Bulgaria remains the poorest country in the European Union with the lowest GDP per capita income. It has the highest number of people in social deprivation over 65 years of age in Europe. 45% of the population cannot afford at least one healthy meal every two days.

Our Street Mercy program in Sofia supported 155 people and served 31,505 meals in 2022.



"Thanks to your financial support, we were able to help almost 600 refugees from Ukraine find shelter, food, hygiene items, spiritual support and more", says Sarkis. "For several months, we have also run Bulgarian language courses for Ukrainian children and young people."

## ROMANIA

**Facts: Population: 19.1 million** 

35% of the population live in severe poverty.

The Bible Correspondence Course in Romania is our largest with 3,726 people enrolled. In 2022 our Bible Coordinators wrote letters to more than 3,000 children, teaching and encouraging them about God.

"Ever since our children were enrolled in the program you have always helped us. I don't know of anybody else who has

done such a thing for us." Romanian family.

### **BOSNIA-HERZEGOVINA**

Facts: Population: 3.3 million

40% of the population live in severe poverty. 68% of our beneficiaries face unemployment. 40,682 Soup Kitchen meals were served in 2022 – more than in any other country we work in apart from Ukraine.



"In 2022, we moved forward with a new after school project in the Tuzla community", comments Dalibor. "This almost doubled in numbers in just a few months, as the children love it so much."

## **MOLDOVA**

Facts: Population: 2.6 million

85% of our beneficiaries do not have access to a

water tap in their homes.

90% of beneficiaries live without an inside toilet. Around 80,000 Ukrainian refugees received help through the Mission in Moldova during 2022.

# **UKRAINF**

Facts Population: 43.8 million.

The level of poverty in Ukraine has risen to 7 million and is set to increase to 55% of the population by the end of 2023. Inflation in the country reached 26% at the end of 2022.

As a result of the war with Russia, Ukraine has become the poorest country in Europe. Around 1,900 educational buildings have been damaged because of Russian attacks and the war is estimated to have disrupted education for 9

million children.

**M**eanwhile, an estimated 6 million people are now internally displaced by the war, many living in the western region of Ukraine, where Mission Without Borders have operations. With high inflation and unemployment, many families are living in damaged homes, struggling to meet their basic needs, including food, water and medicine.

At the Mission we have been enormously grateful to donors, churches and charitable trusts who generously gave £454,000 in 2022 and helped us serve thousands of meals, lay on accommodation and support over 80,000 refugee families with food, hygiene and clothing. Our strong presence with "on the ground" Ukrainian teams enabled us to respond quickly, ensuring aid was put to good use effectively and efficiently. Our network of church partners was also critical.

Thanks to your ongoing prayers and support, MWB's response has continued and is ongoing in 2023.



Recently, Stephen Young, MWB International CEO, and Viorel Radu, International Field Director, visited Ukraine.

"Listening to the experiences of our staff in Ukraine and praying and sharing with the team was special. It is clear they remain hopeful and believe God will bring peace, however there is still anxiety and stress in everyday living. While in Rivne, there were two air raid sirens at night reminding us that there is still a war, even though Rivne is in a so-called safer part of the country.

Our arrival in Sarny coincided with a meeting where newly arrived refugees come and receive emergency food packages, spend time with staff and volunteers and share in a time of devotion. We shared a few words from Psalm 46, and Isaiah 41. It was a powerful and emotive meeting as two groups of refugees then recounted their own personal story. It brought to life the reality of the difficulties they face but also the reality of the biblical words that Viorel and I shared. God is real and involved and yet life is still tough.

One lady told of how she escaped from Mariupol with her daughter, one of the city's worst hit. Another couple shared how they escaped the floods after the Kakhovka dam was broken and survived crossing a river to safety, during which they saw others fired on by soldiers.

They have all been supported by the Mission and are powerful examples of the impact of this terrible war but also of God's hand".

In February 2022 there was a rocket attack near to where Yulia Chibisova and her children lived. "The children started asking me what happens when we die," Yulia told us. MWB are now supporting the family. Yulia said, "We've received so much help from the Mission and from the local church that it's hard to put it into words!"





The Mission might help with funds to set up a café for a widow to support her children with in Durres, Albania, an oven to bake dough bases to sell in Moldova or a motorised cultivator in Bosnia-Herzegovina to enable a family to grow crops.

This investment in the lives of families by the Mission is carefully considered and is usually a family who we know and have built up trust and a solid relationship with through our sponsorship programme. Families like the Kryvchuks in western Ukraine who own a farm in the western region. They were struggling to make ends meet, even before the war broke out. Serhiy and his whole family work hard, planting wheat and potatoes and tending pigs, cows and sheep.

Serhiy told us, "to work our three hectares of land, we were using horsepower, our own hands and a rented tractor service. It was so hard, expensive and exhausting. Recently, the Mission provided us with a new tractor which has brought so much more efficiency to our work and made a huge difference."

Funds for every item of equipment are raised through our individual donors. Supporters like David and Edna from Sutton Coalfield who have been faithfully giving to our work for over 20 years. David has worked in agriculture all his life and heard about our need for a mini tractor to help the Shaporda family who live in the Rivne area of Ukraine.

"Tractors have been a part of my life from a very young age as I was brought up on a small holding and as dad was not very keen on the tractor I ended up as tractor driver," David told us. "In the sixties I bought a hedge cutter that fitted on the back of it and started up as an agricultural contractor for the next 47 years. We will follow our friends in Ukraine with much interest".

The Shaporda family aim to grow crops which will not only ensure the children eat nutritious meals but any surplus produce can also be taken to the local market to sell.

profit, said 'This experience helped me to see the importance of effective marketing and high-quality packaging. Our products were packaged in a very unique and eye-catching way and this helped our sales'.

Polliner Chukwuma, Head of Business Studies at the Academy commented, "the students have been taught that businesses should give something

back to their local communities and to other worthy causes. We want to raise entrepreneurs that will operate with this mindset, and I am particularly proud that the girls carried out the entire project with genuine and heartfelt compassion.

# OPPORTUNITIES AND HOPE THROUGH EDUCATION

One of our most exciting areas of work is in education which can play a huge impact in breaking the chain of generational poverty. Last year 567 children attended 17 After School Class centres and 705 young people took up MWB scholarships to attend vocational college or university. Miranda and Emina are two young people whose lives are being transformed because of your support.

# Miranda from north-west Romania

Ten-year old Miranda loves the peace at the After School club run by the Mission in partnership with the local Baptist church in Simleu Silvaniei, a small town in Romania. Twenty-five children now attend, where they have a warm meal and homework support. Miranda is able to focus on her homework, write, and read her Bible. Maths is her favourite subject, and she dreams of becoming a Maths teacher when she's older. "Thank you for helping me do my homework and for this nice place to come to", she told us. "Doing it at home by myself

would be very difficult as my parents aren't able to help me."

Parents are often so preoccupied with survival and finding enough money for the next meal, they don't have the capacity to support their children with their schoolwork. Also, some schools still bear remnants of the Communist era, where shouting at children was normal. The Mission After School club in Simleu is a safe haven, "We love it here because the people here don't yell at us...they care about what we think," one child told us.



# **Emina from Bosnia-Herzegovina**

Emina is 23, and from Bugojno, a town in the mountains of central Bosnia-Herzegovina. Her family were so poor that in 2013 they were enrolled on MWB's sponsorship programme. College costs for Emina were simply beyond the family's reach and, in a country where 60% of young people are unemployed, good education is vital to secure employment. "There was a time when I thought that I wouldn't even be able to enrol in college, despite all the good grades and awards that I have," Emina told us.

Seeing her ability, MWB supported Emina's college course in Road and City Traffic Management. Emina has kept in touch with the Mission during her course. "MWB changed my life in so many good ways. It would be hard to imagine life without the impact it's had on our family."

Recently Emina graduated and received special recognition as the best student in her generation. "I have not betrayed your trust and support during my education", she told us. Her future looks bright thanks to the opportunity she had to study further at university.

It is all about building relationships – with churches, local communities and with families – creating opportunities where children can be encouraged, supported, and see their lives transformed. These relationships are at the heart of all we do – trusted and close relationships with the families living in poverty that we support from the smallest baby to the oldest grandparent.

This year we have been touched by the thoughtfulness of supporters who have taken out new sponsorships for a child or family for the first time.

work in Bulgaria that caught our attention – it was such a different world to ours and it felt important to help people you would never come across, living in such poverty. For Sally and myself, with a young, growing family, we wanted to support families less fortunate."

Over the years, Ian, a now retired computer operations manager, and Sally, a former primary school teacher and now working as a counsellor, have sponsored around seven families. Currently they are sponsoring two families – the Lozhnichenco family from Moldova and the Borzuk family from Sarny in Ukraine.

The Borzuks found life very hard during the lockdown, with difficulties for children home studying with no internet, along with no work to be found for Vasyl, the father. Now he has temporary employment and Mariya, the mother, and the children look after the cow, horse, pigs and plant their field with seasonal crops. The children also attend Sunday school. Like all families in Ukraine, the war has devastated the economy and broken their way of life, although the family are in the western region away from the main theatre of operations.



Both Ian and Sally love the Christian aspect of all MWB seeks to do, sharing the hope that is found in Jesus Christ through word and deed. "We love the work being done at the Mission Summer Camps," says Sally. "We enjoyed summer camps when we were younger and know what a week in an environment that is safe and special can mean. It can be life transforming for young people."

"What we like about sponsorship is how straight forward the process is. You can be a blessing in a part of the world that you have previously known nothing about or had any connection with."

I was at teacher training college and also went to a number of conferences at Hildenborough Hall. My husband was an elder in the Baptist Church and I still run a House Group. We meet in the house of a lady who is 92!"

"I find it heartbreaking seeing families suffer - it especially hurts me to see children stuck in the circumstances they were born into. Families benefit greatly from receiving OCL boxes - they feel loved and cared for by God." Boris, MWB Coordinator in Moldova.

Thanks to you – our incredible supporters in the UK – over £100,000 was raised last year towards sending 42,000 OCL boxes to families, young people and the elderly in need throughout the region, including 9,500 boxes distributed into Moldova. One of these was to Viorica, the mother of three lively young boys living in Cantemir.

Along with her husband, Grigore, they live in deep poverty, crammed together in an old single roomed home, with no access to running water. The children carry buckets of water from the local village well for drinking, washing laundry and bathing. In winter, washing and wringing out clothes is done by hand. "The cold water makes my hands freeze and my wrists hurt," explains Viorica.

Usually, Viorica gives the children porridge to eat for lunch, but they often ask her, "Mum, are we ever going to have meat again sometime?" Last winter, soaring food and firewood prices made it an especially hard struggle. Nineyear-old Dumitru is not able to see much of a future.

"To be honest, I don't know what I want to become when I grow up."

MWB firmly believe the children do have a future and that with support and encouragement, it will be a bright one. Each child is now enrolled on MWB's child sponsorship programme.

Last Christmas, our family Mission worker, Boris, had a wonderful surprise for the whole family, bringing them an OCL box. "The most I can ever imagine usually giving my kids for Christmas is a piece of bread on the Christmas table. Boris visited us at just the right moment!" explains Viorica.

For many families in poverty, Christmas is a time when all they want is food. Empty cupboards, a lack of income

and high prices mean that children's basic needs are barely being met and celebrating Christ's birthday is an impossibility.

Boris says, "OCL boxes are a great help to families. We can accomplish something wonderful for the glory of Christ if we work together!"

Lastly, a big thanks to Christian Hope International, whose supporters not only gave very generously to the Mission's work in Ukraine last year but who also provide storage space for




receiving our knitwear. Thank you, Pauline, Carmen and Joff.

# WHERE FUNDS WERE RAISED IN 2022

The war in Ukraine prompted an amazing and humbling outpouring of generosity from new supporters, churches, charitable trusts and the general public who gave £454,000 to help those affected by this devastating war. With this support, as well as from new donors and increasing numbers of sponsors, total donations of £1,146,547 were received. Legacy gifts of £57,285 were down on last year however corporate donations (Gifts In Kind) were up 11.5% on the previous year at £2,277,222 largely due to the response from the business community to the Ukraine war.


